Measure RR: SF Bay Area Rapid Transit District Bond Measure (2/3 required to pass) *Did not pass in Contra Costa County, but did in Alameda and San Francisco	Passed (71% voted yes)
Measure C1: Alameda County & Contra Costa Transit District Special Tax Measure (2/3 required to pass)	Passed (79% voted yes)

Mountain View: Measure V, Rent Control Charter Amendment (stronger tenant protections than Measure W)	Passed (52%)
Oakland: Measure JJ, strengthens just cause for eviction protections by mandating “just cause” for evictions in buildings built between 1981 and 1995.	Passed (74%)
Richmond: Measure L Rent Control and Just Cause Evictions (majority required to pass)	Passed (64%)
Alameda: Measure L1, (proposed by city council as an alternative to Measure M1)	Passed (56%)
Alameda: Measure M1, Rent Control Charter Amendment (stronger tenant protections than L1)	Failed (66%)
Burlingame: Measure R	No (67%)
San Mateo: Measure Q	No (61%)
Mountain View: Measure W, Rent Stabilization (proposed by city council as an alternative to Measure V)	No (51%)

Bay Area Affordable Housing Measures	
Alameda County: Measure A1, a \$580 million housing bond	Passed (73%)
Alameda County: Berkeley, Measure Z1, gives the city green light to create 500 new below-market-rate units	Passed (83%)
Alameda County: Oakland, Measure KK, \$600 million infrastructure bond earmarking \$100 million for affordable housing	Passed (81%)
Santa Clara County: Measure A, \$950 million to create and preserve an estimated 5,000 affordable housing units	Passed (67%)
San Mateo County: Measure K, extends a half-cent sales tax through 2043 to help fund affordable housing for families, seniors, veterans and people with disabilities	Passed (70%)
San Francisco: Proposition C, allow the city to repurpose \$261 million in unused general obligation bond funding to be used to acquire and rehabilitate multi-unit properties and convert them to permanently affordable housing.	Passed (76%)
